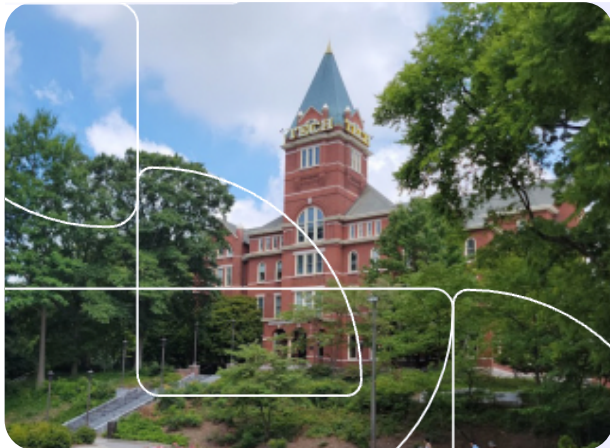
Dialogue is not a one-off event—it's a cultural practice.

What Is The Ecosystem Approach?

A campus-wide strategy that embeds dialogue into everyday campus life.

The goal is to create a robust campus culture that is:

- **Resilient:** Survives leadership turnover, campus conflicts, and budget changes
- **Interconnected:** Spans classrooms, governance, clubs, and community
- **Self-sustaining:** Fueled by relationships, skill building, and shared practices

Three Stages of Building a Dialogue Ecosystem

Stage 1

See The System

Map the Dialogue Landscape

Identify where dialogue is already happening; courses, student orgs, residence halls, advising, and more.

Connect the Dots

Link these efforts to form a visible, reinforcing network of dialogue across campus.

Engage Key Influencers

Presidents, provosts, deans, faculty, and student affairs leaders set the tone, modeling dialogue is essential.

Stage 2

Build With Intention

Use Intentional Frameworks

The ecosystem approach connects campus-wide efforts. Many institutions also draw from proven models:

- **Kettering Foundation's** Deliberative Democracy
- **Collective Impact Framework**
- **Vuslat Foundation's** Generous Listening

Start Small. Scale Strategically.

Pilots help test ideas, build momentum, and demonstrate value. Focus on:

- Voluntary participation
- Cross-functional stakeholders
- Peer engagement
- Clear goals and metrics

Create Campus Connection Points

Link first-year orientation dialogue to faculty seminars for long-term continuity.

Stage 3

Fuel Long-Term Momentum

Share Impact Stories

Use real examples and outcomes to build awareness and support.

Create Many Doorways In

Offer diverse entry points—from informal events to structured programs.

Assess and Strengthen the Network

Track where your dialogue ecosystem is strong—and where it can grow.

From Initiative To Identity

The goal isn't to generate surface-level activity, but to foster deep transformation.
